## 14 Quilts To Area Veterans Saturday Afternoon By Mary Anne Maxwell The Olney Valor Quilters hosted an awards ceremony Saturday afternoon at the Olney Church of the Nazarene.

The group awarded quilts made by the Olney Valor Quilters to 14 veterans who have served during World War II, Korean War, Vietnam

One of Saturday afternoon's quilt recipients was Gerald Lee Harvey of Clay City. He served in the U.S. Army during the Vietnam War from

Andrea Baker, the group's Leader welcomed everyone to the presentation and thanked the veterans in the audience for serving our country. Nancy Morris noted the quilts were for those who served and came home to honor their service.

"And to Vietnam Veterans, welcome home," she stated.

"We're here to honor your service, for leaving all you held dear." She said the quilts are made of three layers and went on to note what each of those layers represent: the top of the quilt is made of different colors, shapes and fabrics and represent the recipient, their community and the many individuals in that community; the center layer contains the batting or filler that is the center of the quilt--since it provides warmth, it represents the warmth, comfort and healing it brings to the person who receives it; the backing of the quilt supports the other layers and represents the strength of the recipient of the recipient and the support of their family, community and nation. The stitches hold the layers of the quilt together and represent the love, gratitude and sometimes tears of the quilt maker.

Boy Scout Pack #219 presented the flag at the beginning of the awards ceremony and retired it at the ceremony's conclusion.

A reception was held afterwards for the veterans and their families. Each of the veterans honored Saturday afternoon and awarded a quilt had the quilt wrapped around them and received a hug from two of the Olney Valor Quilters.

Lisa Sutherland organized the Olney Valor Quilters in 2015. The organization was formed nationally by Catherine Roberts, of Seaford, DE in 2003 while her son was serving in Iraq. It is a not-for-profit

organization and everything to make the quilts is donated from the fabrics and backing to the labor of piecing, assembling, and quilting the quilts.

These quilts are for veterans who have served during war time

in a war zone.
